ABSTRACT

The question of the resilience of our societies and communities has become increasingly important in recent years against the backdrop of growing feelings of insecurity in the Baltic Sea region. Many stakeholders around the Baltic Sea are currently addressing the question of how resilience can be actively created. One step further, however, an equally important question arises: how can this resilience be maintained and how can long-term tools be developed?

With the Cultural Pearls project as a basis, this workshop is going to explore how to create sustainable resilience in cities and communities. We're taking stock of practices and experiences of the first awarded cities Kiel, Rujiena, Svendborg and Jakobstad and will think up ways to scale up the initial groundwork on resilience that is being done in this as well as in other projects around the Baltic Sea Region.

Our questions are centred on sustainability and durability: How to organise our activities so that they have a lasting impact? What does it take to transfer current and active actions into self-sustaining and long-standing structures? Moreover, which instruments and already existing contexts could be used to achieve the goal of institutionalizing successful initiatives?


