

Smart governments: Harnessing artificial intelligence for public sector transformation

This session aims to provide participants with practical insights on challenges and opportunities for effectively integrating AI into the activities of a local and/or regional administration.

Key discussions points

- Al's relevance to government operations how AI can enhance decision-making, efficiency, and citizen service

They will have heard practical examples and the related challenges and opportunities of AI deployment by public-sector institutions, which may result in knowledge and technology transfer and create the groundwork for future collaboration.

Sustainable resilience in cities and communities through culture - Baltic Sea Cultural Pearls

The question of the resilience of our societies and communities has become increasingly important in recent years against the backdrop of growing feelings of insecurity in the Baltic Sea Region. Many stakeholders around the Baltic Sea are currently addressing the question of how resilience can be actively created. One step further, however, an equally important question arises: how can this resilience be maintained and how can long-term tools be developed?

With the Cultural Pearls project as a basis, this workshop is going to explore how to create sustainable resilience in cities and communities. We're taking stock of practices and experiences of the first awarded cities Kiel, Rujiena, Svendborg and Jakobstad (Pietarsaari) and will think up ways to scale up the initial groundwork on resilience that is being done in this as well as in other projects around the Baltic Sea Region.

Our questions are centred on sustainability and durability: How to organise our activities so that they have a lasting impact? What does it take to transfer current and active actions into self-sustaining and long-standing structures? Moreover, which instruments and already existing contexts could be used to achieve the goal of institutionalizing successful initiatives?

Next steps towards a munitions-free Baltic Sea

Objectives

The workshop will focus on working out the necessary next steps at regional and EU level based on current projects and findings in order to make the handling of dumped munitions future-proof.

Key discussion points

The German immediate program for ammunition recovery - What are the current findings? The importance of regional cooperation and the EU for a munitionsfree Baltic Sea. Financial aspects - How do we achieve sustainable financing and how much will we need to invest?

Expected outcomes

The workshop participants will learn about current examples of possible ways of dealing with dumped munitions and will be able to take the findings into account in the ongoing discussion about an environmentally friendly solution. They will be aware of the particular challenges involved in financing and will be able to draw appropriate conclusions for the further development of the topic.

In defence of EU regional policy

Despite undoubted achievements in the positive (economic) development of many regions in the EU in recent decades, Cohesion Policy is under pressure with a view to the next programming period 2028-2034: challenges such as strengthening the EU's competitiveness, repaying the debt-based EU reconstruction program NextGenerationEU or supporting Ukraine require further investment. As a result, there are fears of a turn away from a Cohesion Policy for all regions. There is an open discussion to centralize Cohesion Policy along the lines of the Recovery and Resilience Facility (RRF). At the same time, the recently published Letta report highlights cross-border obstacles for the final integration of the Single Market.

How can we successfully counter these trends in view of the proposals for regulations expected from the next European Commission in the first half of 2025? What is the role of interregional and cross-border cooperation? What lessons can we draw by innovative solutions such as the instrument for interregional cooperation?





Regional cooperation as driving force behind the development of offshore wind energy in the Baltic Sea

During the workshop there will be given an overview of regional and national activities related to the development of offshore wind energy in the Baltic Sea area and an expert discussion on the role of local governments and initiatives integrating the main stakeholders in the implementation of investments in offshore wind farms.

Energy transformation and achieving ambitious EU goals related to the implementation of Green Deal will not come true without active actions in the Baltic Sea Region. It is crucial for the Baltic Sea Region to focus on building long-lasting foundations for energy independence, educational and market transformations. Actions taken so far in individual regions are insufficient. Greater mobilization and coordination are needed. The offshore wind energy industry is at the forefront of these green changes.

During the workshop we will adress the following questions: How to effectively build Baltic content in fair mutual cooperation? What role can regional authorities play in this process and what activities should be coordinated at the national level or across state borders?

Fighting for democracy by combatting fake news and disinformation

In this workshop, participants will learn about the different forms of mis- and disinformation, ranging from a simple "myth" to FIMI (Foreign Information Manipulation and Interference). They will work on different examples of mainly Russian disinformation and FIMI campaigns, which the European External Action Service has monitored and debunked since 2015. Participants will also learn about EU policy responses and other measures to fight against disinformation. In the last part of the workshop, they will get an overview of the most useful tips and tricks for correct fact checking and how to behave on social media. Participants will get an overview of the different kind of mis- and disinformation and on what the EU does to fight off and to prevent disinformation campaigns on its own territory. They will learn that the EU does not only have an own monitoring framework but has also passed legislation which will help to keep disinformation campaigns at bay. Participants will also be more confident in their own fact-checking skills after the workshop.

Join the dialogue: Shaping the future of BSR-Ukraine cooperation

The following questions will be adressed:

1. What BSR could give to Ukraine, what Ukraine could give to us?

Defining mutual expectations in a strategic dimension: how each party perceives the potential cooperation of BSR with Ukraine.

2. What are our and their expectations, needs and visions of future cooperation?

Determining the possibilities of cooperation in the technical dimension: what are the legal, organizational and financial possibilities of developing cooperation, implementing joint activities and creating organizations coordinating joint short- and long-term projects (in particular, determining the formal and actual conditions for the independence of Ukrainian regions).

3. Practical aspects of cooperation - political, economic, administrative, social

Determining the external conditions of regional cooperation: to what extent and at what level political contacts are required (to initiate and conduct joint ventures), to what extent it is possible to include non-administrative circles (business, investors, youth, cultural circles, etc.), and what areas should be covered by administrative cooperation?

Developing and employing hydrogen infrastructure in Northern Europe: Stakeholder perspectives on cross-border cooperation and the future of sustainable transport

This panel will bring together key stakeholders from hydrogen interest organizations, HDV companies and policy makers from Scandinavia, Germany and the broader Baltic Sea region to discuss the development and implementation of hydrogen infrastructure in Northern Europe.

The main objectives are to raise awareness of the critical importance of hydrogen infrastructure, to address the lack of political support, and to identify solutions to cross[®] industry and cross-border policy challenges.

The discussion will cover a range of topics such as the integration of hydrogen infrastructure projects with initiatives such as GREATER4H, the impact on the HDV sector, political and regulatory support, funding strategies, technological and operational challenges, and the promotion of stakeholder cooperation. These topics will be further narrowed down in collaboration with the panelists to ensure a focused and relevant discussion.

This is broader selection of potential topics that could be covered. The session will conclude with an interactive session where the audience can ask questions of the speakers to ensure a dynamic and engaging discussion.

What is BSR Cultural Pearls?

The BSR Cultural Pearls initiative aims to make smaller towns, cities and municipalities in the Baltic Sea Region more visible, attractive and livable. By engaging citizens in cultural activities, the initiative seeks to enhance the quality of life and foster a stronger sense of social resilience.

Why is social resilience important?

Countries around the Baltic Sea, despite their diverse backgrounds, face similar challenges like climate change, urbanization, economic instability and aging populations. Social resilience, or the ability of communities to overcome challenges, is crucial for tackling these issues. BSR Cultural Pearls aims to help communities in the Baltic Sea Region build social resilience by promoting cultural engagement and nurturing a sense of belonging and trust among citizens.

How does culture improve social resilience?

Cultural activities - such as music, dance, theatre and visual arts - are vital for bringing people together and creating social connections. These activities help communities stay strong and united, strengthening their ability to manage future challenges.

How does it work?

Each year, BSR Cultural Pearls invites municipalities from less central areas of the Baltic Sea Region to apply for this transformative journey through an open application process. Through a selection process, four municipalities with outstanding culture-driven social resilience plans are awarded the BSR Cultural Pearls title. The awarded municipalities embark on a one-year programme to implement their plans with support from mentors, experts and resources of the European Union.





Cultural Pearls 2024

Jakobstad/Pietarsaari, Finland

Jakobstad (Pietarsaari), aims to enhance cultural engagement by revitalizing the Old Fire Station into a community hub. The town's bilingual nature and history of migration have created cultural assets that need better coordination. The plan focuses on uniting residents, integrating refugees and bridging gaps between Swedish and Finnish speakers.





Svendborg, Denmark

Svendborg, faces challenges from an aging population and rising youth discontent. The municipality's Culture and Resilience Action Plan focuses on enhancing social engagement among children and youth. By fostering participation in community activities and co-creation, the plan aims to build resilience and strengthen future generations.

Rūjiena, Latvia

Rūjiena, Latvia's northernmost town, is focusing on creating a socially resilient and democratic community through its Culture and Resilience Action Plan. Priorities include fostering local and cross-border cooperation, enhancing intergenerational dialogue and strengthening residents' sense of belonging to make rural life more attractive and engaging.





Kiel, Germany

Kiel, the capital of Schleswig-Holstein, focuses on empowering children and young people through cultural learning to enhance social resilience. With a significant migrant population and high unemployment in certain districts, Kiel aims to foster integration and intercultural dialogue, reduce social divides and promote inclusion for marginalized groups and people with disabilities.



Lykke Friis is the current director of the Think Tank Europa and the Co-Chair of the European Council on Foreign Relations. Furthermore, she holds several public and societal offices. She has a Ph.D degree in Political Science from the University of Copenhagen. Being an expert on European and EU affairs, she has been repeatedly appointed to political forums and published several books about European affairs. Her university career as Prorector for the University of Copenhagen was interrupted by serving two years as Cabinet Minister of Climate, Energy and Gender Equality.

Werner Schwarz has been minister since June 2022 at the Ministry of Agriculture, Rural Affairs and Consumer Areas, European Protection (MLLEV) of Schleswig-Holstein. He is responsible for the agricultural sector and all associated challenges, rural development, forestry and fishing as well as various aspects relating to European politics and consumer protection in Schleswig-Holstein. Schwarz has completed his education as a state-certified farmer. Before becoming Minister, he has been president of the Schleswig-Holstein farmers` association and vice-president of the German farmers' association. He lives with his wife in the south of Schleswig-Holstein and has three grown-up children.







Daniel Günther (born 1973) is the Minister-President of Land Schleswig-Holstein since 2017. He studied Political Science, National Economics, and Psychology at Kiel University completed with a Master's Degree. From 2005 to 2012 he was the Managing Director of CDU Schleswig-Holstein. Since 2009 he has been a member of Parliament of Land Schleswig-Holstein. From 2014 to 2017 he was Chief Whip of the CDU Parliamentary Party. From 2018 to 2019 he was the President of the German Bundesrat.

Henningsen Bernd is honorary professor at the Department of Northern European Studies, Humboldt-University Berlin. He studied Political Science, Nordic Philology, Philosophy and Psychology at the Ludwig Maximilian University in Munich and obtained a Ph.D in 1974. He gualified as professor in 1984 researching the welfare state of Sweden. He was professor of Scandinavian studies (1992-2002), (founding) director of the Department of Northern European Studies and head of the Baltic Sea School, Berlin. In 2005 he also became honorary professor at the Department of Political Science at the University of Copenhagen and continued as professor of Scandinavian and Cultural Studies at the Department for Northern European Studies, Humboldt-University Berlin. He retired in 2010.







Ulf Kämpfer (SPD) has been Mayor of the Land Capital Kiel since 2014. The lawyer and Secretary of State of the Schleswig-Holstein Ministry of the Environment became Mayor as the ioint candidate for SPD, the Greens (Grüne) and SSW in the fifth direct elections for Kiel's Mayor in March 2014. He was reelected in October 2019. Mayor Kämpfer is also responsible for the industry sector at Kiel Town Hall. His department includes the Press and Public Relations Office, the Legal Office, the Audit Office, the Department of Economic Affairs, the Office for Equality and Land Capital Kiel's investment management company. In addition, he is Vice-President of Association the of German Cities. Ulf Kämpfer is married and has one son.

Eka von Kalben has been a member of the Landtag of Schleswig-Holstein since 2012. As of June 2022, she serves as vice-president of the Landtag. From 2012 to 2022 she was the parliamentary leader for The Greens. She is currently the groups' speaker for European policy, religion and national minorities. Prior to becoming a Member of the Landtag. She worked in public administration and studied history and political science at the university of Hagen. She has three adult children and lives in the south of Schleswig-Holstein, near Pinneberg.







For the past two years, Silva Laure has served as the Vice-Chair of the Baltic Sea Region Youth Forum's (BSRYF) legislative body - the Committee of Youth Representatives (CYR), a regional youth body facilitated by the Council of the Baltic Sea States (CBSS). Silva, along with 15 other members of the CYR, is responsible for exploring & developing new perspectives and policies on core themes of the CBSS, promoting meaningful youth involvement in relevant organizations and institutions, and advancing the initiatives of the BSRYF. In addition to her role in the Committee, Silva is a student of Medicine in Riga, Latvia.

Hanne Klintøe is a visionary strategic leader, advisor and organisational developer. She is the founder of two advisory agencies, delivering strategies, leadership support, and transformative projects to global organisations. Hanne has raised considerable EU funding for and developed multiple initiatives to drive the green transition within sustainable transport and infrastructure for the STRING Megaregion, and was a strong voice behind the recommendations to the Danish government regarding cross-border hydrogen infrastructure to Germany. She recently relocated to Denmark's hotspot for Power-to-X, Aabenraa Municipality.







Anna Lührmann was born 1983 in Lich in Hesse, Germany. She is minister of state at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs of Germany. She holds a BA in Political Science, a MA in Gender and Peace Studies and a MA in Research Training in Social Sciences. She obtained a Ph. D in political sciences on democracy. She was a Member of the German Bundestag from 2002 to 2009. From 2010 to 2012 she advised the United Nations Development Programme on parliamentary elections in Sudan and youth participation. For six years she worked at the Varieties of Democracy Institute (V-Dem) at the University of Gothenburg. She was its Deputy Director from 2018 to 2020. In 2020 she appointed "Docent" by proof of was achievements equivalent to a second dissertation.

In 2021 she returned to politics.

Levits was born in 1955 in Riga. Egils Emigrated to Germany in 1972 and studied law and political science at the University of Hamburg. Research assistant at the University of Kiel and later at the Institute for German and East European Studies in Göttingen. From 1992 to 1993 Latvia's Ambassador to Germany. From 1993 to 1994 Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Justice. Latvia's Ambassador to Austria from 1994 to 1995. From 1995 to 2004 judge at the European Court of Human Rights. From 2004 to 2019 judge at the Court of Justice of the European Union. What to see

The **Welcome Center** at the Kieler Förde is the tourist information office. It provides information about local attractions, events and other important details about your stay in Kiel to help you make the most of your visit.

Enjoy a walk along the **Kiellinie**, Kiel's beautiful waterfront promenade that stretches along the Kiel Fjord. There you can enjoy fish sandwiches and fish 'n' chips. It's a place to meet for a beer or wine. Alternatively, you can relax on a beach lounge. There are also two designated bathing platforms along the Kiellinie: Bellevue and Kiellinie. These spots are ideal for a refreshing swim or sunbathing, offering direct access to the clean waters of the fjord. From the Kiellinie, at the Reventlou pier you can take the Fjord ferry to Laboe. Laboe is especially popular with tourists and offers a true vacation atmosphere.

In Kiel, you can explore eight museums located close to the fjord, most of which are free. All museums are within walking distance and invite you to take a stroll through Kiel's city center.

In Kiel, there are several beaches on both the eastern and western shores, which can be reached by the Fjord ferry. Falckenstein is a district in Kiel known for its popular beach. The beach features a wide, sandy shore along the Kiel Fjord.
