ABSTRACT

1. What BSR could give to Ukraine, what Ukraine could give to us?

Defining mutual expectations in a strategic dimension: how each party perceives the potential cooperation of BSR with Ukraine. What are its potential benefits and what purpose would it serve? An attempt to identify development areas of key importance for both parties: which may be the subject of cooperation.

2. What are our and their expectations, needs and visions of future cooperation?

Determining the possibilities of cooperation in the technical dimension: what are the legal, organizational and financial possibilities of developing cooperation, implementing joint activities and creating organizations coordinating joint short- and long-term projects (in particular, determining the formal and actual conditions for the independence of Ukrainian regions). Identification of existing and potential problems and challenges and outline of proposals for their solutions. Defining the vision of cooperation in the next few years and beyond.

3. Practical aspects of cooperation – political, economic, administrative, social

Determining the external conditions of regional cooperation: to what extent and at what level political contacts are required (to initiate and conduct joint ventures), to what extent it is possible to include non-administrative circles (business, investors, youth, cultural circles, etc.), and what areas should be covered by administrative cooperation? What formula ensures the best results: developing solutions through administrative means or involving social organizations and entrepreneurs?

The Interreg Europe programme area has expanded to include Ukraine, with Interreg Europe facilitating this enlargement by offering cities and regions opportunities for cooperation beyond traditional funding. Interreg Europe provides a Policy Learning Platform, which includes peer reviews and matchmaking services. It emphasizes getting started with network building through best practice examples, with some projects already underway. In addition to funding, Interreg Europe offers knowledge exchange, access to researchers, and other resources to support larger-scale program development.

Andriy Martynenko is an expert in international cooperation, with a focus on the Baltic Sea Region. Since 2016, he has been serving at the Council of the Baltic Sea States (CBSS) Secretariat in Stockholm, where he coordinates knowledge exchange, capacity building, and joint projects among diverse stakeholders in the region.

In his role, Mr. Martynenko supports the CBSS Civil Protection Network and coordinates Policy Area Secure within the EU Strategy for the Baltic Sea Region. A significant part of his work involves initiating and managing cross-sectoral, multidisciplinary projects in societal security. These projects bring together governments, academia, NGOs, and businesses to address pressing common issues such as warning systems, crisis and risk communication, climate change risks, volunteerism, youth engagement in disaster risk reduction, and support for Ukraine.

Before joining the CBSS, Mr. Martynenko worked for the United Nations and the Swedish government.

Thorsten Kohlisch has dedicated the last 20 years of his professional career to regional development and European cooperation. In his Senior Advisor function at the Berlin Senate until 2010, he supported Berlin's economic integration in the Baltic Sea Region and the "Oder-Partnership" with Western Poland, actively using the opportunities of the ERDF and Interreg.

Since 2010, his management responsibilities in different Interreg programmes (Interreg IVC, Interreg South Baltic, Interreg Euregio Meuse-Rhine) allowed him to drive complex programme development and implementation processes at cross-border and interregional levels. Until today, impact orientation, stakeholder engagement and an open ear for the emerging needs of programme beneficiaries are key principles guiding his work.
